PLEASE NOTE THE FOLLOWING DATES:

Nomination papers can be picked up in the Town Clerk's Office anytime, but must be returned to the Town Clerk's Office no later than March 13, 2023. There must be 20 valid signatures of registered voters in the Town of Erving to place your name on the ballot. It is recommended that you obtain extra signatures in the event that someone signs that is not a registered voter, which is a very common occurrence.

The Annual Town Meeting will be Wednesday May 10, 2023 with the location and starting time to be set by the Select Board. The Annual Town Elections will be Monday May 1st with the polling hours from 10:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. at the Erving Town Hall, 12 East Main Street.

In May of 2023, my three-year term as an Erving Selectmen will come to an end. 





As reminder Massachusetts allows residents to burn brush between January 15 and May 1, depending on weather conditions. You must obtain permission from the Fire Department or http://www.fcburnpermits.com/. The permits are free of charge, but availability depends on weather conditions.

Regulations

- You may only burn BRUSH! All other materials are illegal. No leaves, grass, hay, stumps, building debris or any other materials are allowed to be burned.
- All open burning must be a minimum of 75 feet from buildings or structures.
- Burning will be allowed to start at 10:00am and must be extinguished by 4pm.
- Any open fire must be attended at all times by the permit holder.
- No person shall set, maintain, or increase a fire in open air at any time except by permission.
- You must be 18 years or older to apply for permit and/or set, maintain, or increase fire once permission has been granted by the Fire Department.
- You must have an appropriate means to extinguish an open-air fire completely at the end of the day or if requested by the Fire Department.
- The Fire Department can refuse or cancel a permit at any time. (Example: Violation of permit regulations or change in weather conditions.)
- Open burning season is January 15 May 1.
- Massachusetts Regulation 310 CMR: DEP 7.07 "Open Burning"

News of Poplar Mountain Conservation Area

December 11th was a chilly and cloudy day but 9 people; including a repeat appearance by one hesitant grandson; and one dog (although as big as some in the humans in the group) attended and went around portions of Poplar Mountain Yellow Trail. There were 5 or so new folks and a good time was had by all. There are icicles on the Weeping Wall and the bear has likely retired to her den. There are four more names on the list of those interested in goings on in the conservation area.

I had a brief talk after the hike with Todd and Liese at the farm on Old State Road and looked at some pictures of the original area 'back in the day'. No trees at all and a big barn on the hill behind the house. Quite a change? I have talked to a few residents who remember parts of this.

With the mild winter there have been more individuals using the conservation area. A recent Sunday saw over 10 individuals out on the trails. Please remember to use the marked entrances and not private land where old trails used to go.

We have a hike on "Winter Tracking" scheduled for Saturday February 25th with David Brown. He has led hikes in Northfield and throughout the region. It will be February and dress for the weather. A thermos of coffee or cocoa in the car is a regular for me. Bring snowshoes with cleats or devises on boots depending on snow and/or ice conditions. Trekking poles or a ski pole are also helpful when going up or down hill. We plan on starting at 9 and being done around noon at the new parking lot.

We also are scheduling a late March hike with Adam Kohl of Wendell which is titled "Plants and Insects in Late Winter", although I'm hoping there will be some life showing in our vernal pools by then.



The Kiosk is in, Thanks Glen, crew, and Bryan. We are waiting for a large map, and a few other additions. We can always use volunteers. Small projects waiting for a nice day include turning a Birch log by the Weeping Wall into a low bench and a little brushing out where the yellow trail recrosses the power line.

Come out when the weather is nice and look for tracks in the snow and owls staking out territory for nesting in the later winter.

Preschool and Kindergarten Registration

Erving Elementary School is beginning to register preschool and kindergarten aged students for the 2023-2024 school year.

Preschool: If you have a child who will be 3 or 4 years old by September 1, 2023 and you live in the town of Erving, they are eligible to attend preschool at Erving Elementary School.

<u>Kindergarten</u>: If you have a child who will be 5 years old by September 1, 2023, and you live in the town of Erving, he/she is eligible to attend kindergarten at Erving Elementary School.

**Students currently attending Erving Elementary School are automatically enrolled for their next school year.

A Letter to the Residents of Erving From the Erving Teachers' Association

You may have heard some of what is happening with contract negotiations between the teachers of the children of our community and the elected school officials. In last month's Around Town, the school committee chairwoman shared her view on negotiations. Since Around Town published her individual letter, we felt it was only fair that we share our thoughts, as well. We'd like to take a different approach, though. The chair published her letter on her own, without any consultation or discussion with other members of her committee in public session. The Erving Teachers' Association agrees on the contents of this letter since we value all of our voices, not just the opinion of one person.

What does school look like now for students?

As you may know, or expect, school is very different than it was pre-covid. While over a year of remote teaching allowed students to access curriculum and standards via screen, it also inadvertently created new challenges that no one could ever have anticipated. Students who didn't have direct supervision would do other things, such as watch tv, play video games, or just plain log out and not participate. Many students now have trouble understanding basic school expectations that they do have to be present and participate. Students have been traumatized and they are bringing a broken sense of school and lack of grade-appropriate student skill into the classroom.

What is different? Students need more time and opportunities to build up a better understanding of what it means to take initiative and sustain stamina. Understandably, the learning process has shifted but we still have the great responsibility to educate. Teachers do this while navigating the following:

- dysregulated behaviors
- anger outbursts that range from verbal abuse to physical destruction
- anxious students who struggle maintaining focus
- apathy for learning
- disruptions in attendance

Yes, Covid may be over, or nearly over, but the effects of it are very much still with us. We are doing this all with fewer staff than before. Our behavior specialist has retired and the position has not been filled. Multiple support staff paraprofessionals have left and replacements haven't been hired. These positions are not being filled due to lack of applicants. Those that remain are doing more with less.

What we are looking for:

1. More preparation time:

Currently, we are given only 150 minutes of prep time per week (equivalent to 30 minutes/day). We asked for 225 minutes/week (45 mins/day), which is typical in most every district. The best offer we received from the school committee was just another 5 minutes per day, for 175 mins/week. We acquiesced, since that's all they would offer. We question why lesson preparation and teacher collaboration to best provide for students is disregarded.

2. <u>An added salary lane</u>:

This is for staff who have taken 60 or more post-graduate level credits, which is the equivalent of two Master's Degrees or a Doctorate (PhD). This is a significant amount of work. These courses have to be approved by the principal and superintendent. As you've read, we are dealing with unprecedented student behavior and academic decline. Our membership is consistently taking courses to improve our teaching on how to work with students dealing with trauma, learning loss

and other things. The school committee is only willing to give a PhD column because that is study in a very specific area. In some specific areas that can be important, but as general educators it is important to have advanced knowledge in a wide array of areas because we teach many subjects and deal with a variety of behavioral issues. This enables us to better serve students.

The committee says this lane would cost too much money. We have only 3 members that would currently reach that lane for an approximately \$10,000 total increase.

2. <u>Increased salary</u>: We feel that based on all of the new seriously difficult situations and work conditions that we are dealing with, with less staff to do so, that a 4% increase is fair. The school committee disagrees and feels 2% is. It's taken us a year of negotiations and mediation just to get them to rise to that basic level. The school committee has told us it would cost too much money.

An increase from 2% to 4% would cost approximately \$32,000.

Last year's school budget was just under \$3.5 million. To get to our request we are talking about less than 1% of that budget.

This year 4 town workers outside of the elementary school received increases of over \$56,000 from their previous year's amount. To reach the 4% increase that we feel is fair, it would only cost a total of \$64,000 for our 28 members.

We're happy for all workers in all jobs to get increases. Everyone is suffering through historic inflation that has reached up to 9% last year. We're happy for these administrative town workers to receive these increases. Wouldn't it be nice if firefighters, police officers, highway workers, librarians, town hall staff, water and sewer department workers, senior center employees, and teachers, could receive such increases.

Four New Videos from Recycling Facility Advisory Board

The <u>Springfield Materials Recycling Facility</u> (SMRF) <u>Advisory Board</u> has released four short videos about household recycling to help viewers understand what happens to the materials they recycle. The videos are an antidote to misinterpretations recently shared by media outlets. The new videos are available at <u>springfieldmrf.org</u> and on YouTube (<u>www.youtube.com/@springfieldmrf4175</u>).

The videos focus on four different topics: Container Recycling, Paper and Cardboard Recycling, What Happens to Recycled Materials, and Recycling's Most Unwanted. Produced by Reelife Productions, the videos include interviews with recycling industry experts, footage of recyclables being sorted and baled, and information on the industries that purchase local recyclables for reuse.

These videos will be useful in classrooms, for community sustainability groups, family discussions, social media pages, and other applications. Director and Owner of Reelife Productions, Tom Adams, notes "It's a good feeling to know we are helping to increase the efficiency and efficacy of the recycling program in Massachusetts."

The SMRF annually processes and sells over 18,300 tons (95%) of the material collected by its <u>65 western Massachusetts member communities</u>. Major news outlets have reported that "only a small percentage of plastic is recycled," but that statistic refers to the recycling rate of *all plastic manufactured*, including durable items not intended or designed for recycling. This figure does not refer solely to the items that residents put in their bins.

This new video series clarifies that the items western Massachusetts residents are <u>instructed</u> <u>to recycle</u> have value to processors and manufacturers who turn the materials into new products and packaging. In fiscal year 2022, through the sales of recyclables to commodity markets, the Springfield MRF paid its 65 member communities a combined revenue share of \$375,500.

This new series, along with the already popular <u>Me and My Bin</u> that was released earlier this year, gives western Mass residents a behind-the-scenes look at the environmental and economic values of recycling. The series sends a clear and simple message: **Recycling is important, and we each have a role to play**.


