

# for clearing sidewalks & fire hydrants!



As we prepare for the winter season we wanted to thank property owners for their continued clearing of adjacent sidewalks and the area surrounding fire hydrants.

In accordance with Town of Erving bylaws, property owners are responsible for clearing sidewalks and fire hydrants, that are adjacent to their properties, within 24 hours of the end of a snow storm.

Please note that the bylaw does provide for a penalty for property owners that do not cooperate.

We truly appreciate your cooperation!

ERVING TAXPAYERS: You may be eligible for an exemption on your real estate taxes if you meet certain requirements under Mass General Laws, Chap 59, Section 5. All Exemption Applications are to be filed by April 1st of the fiscal year that the real estate taxes have been issued for. Please note that even if the exemption amount is larger than your total tax bill, Massachusetts General Law states that you must pay 10% of your Real Estate Tax Bill. Listed below are the exemptions that the Town of Erving has authorized:

### Clause 17D (Exemption -\$175)

Widows/Widowers/Persons over 70/Minor Children

This exemption is for widows or widowers, or minor children with a deceased parent or persons 70 years or older.

- 1. You must have owned and occupied the property for at least 5 years and live in your house on July 1 of the year you are filing.
- 2. The value of your estate, minus mortgages, cannot exceed \$40,000. Please note that the value of your home, if not more than a 3 Family is not included in the Estate amount.

### **Clause 22 Veterans Exemptions**

Veterans are individuals who served on active duty in the Armed Forces of the United States for certain time periods during peace or wartime eras and were discharged from military service. In order to be eligible for an exemption, the discharge must be under other than dishonorable conditions.

You must occupy the property as your domicile. If you are a spouse of the veteran, you and the veteran must occupy the property as your domicile. Your domicile is where your principal and legal home is located.

You must own the property and your ownership interest must be worth at least \$2,000. If your property is held in a trust, you must be a Trustee and have an enough beneficial interest in the property.

### Clause 22(a-c)(Exemption- \$400)

Veterans, Spouses (where the domicile is owned by the veteran's spouse) and Surviving Spouses of Veterans (who have never remarried) are eligible if one of the following criteria is met:

- 1. Veteran with a service-connected disability of 10% or more
- 2. Veteran awarded the Purple Heart Medal
- 3. Gold Star Parents

### Clause 22A (Exemption- \$750)

Veterans or Surviving Spouses of Veterans (regardless of current & future marital status), who meet the following requirements is eligible for this exemption:

- 1. Loss or permanent loss of use of one foot or one hand in the line of duty or,
- 2. Lost sight of one eye in the line of duty or,
- 3. Received the Congressional Medal of Honor, or Distinguished Service Cross, or the Navy Cross, or the Air Force Cross.
- 4. The Exemption will be prorated if domicile is greater than a single-family home.

### **Clause 22B (Exemption - \$1,250)**

Veterans or Surviving Spouses of Veterans (regardless of current & future marital status), who meet the following requirements is eligible for this exemption:

- 1. Loss or permanent loss of use of both hands or both feet or,
- 2. Loss or permanent loss of one hand and one foot or,
- 3. Loss of sight in both eyes.

### Clause 22C (Exemption - \$1,500)

Veterans or Surviving Spouses of Veterans (regardless of current & future marital status), who have a permanent and total disability that is service connected and Specially Adapted Housing. The Exemption will be prorated if domicile is greater than a single-family home.

### **Clause 22D (Full Exemption)**

Surviving spouses, until remarried, of service members or guardsmen who are missing in action & presumed to have died or who have died as a result of injuries or illness contracted during active duty.

### **Clause 22E (Exemption - \$1,000)**

Veterans or Surviving Spouses of Veterans (regardless of current and future marital status), who have a 100% Service-Connected Disability as of July 1st of the year you are Applying for the exemption. You must present an annual statement from the Veteran's Administration verifying this 100% disability. The Exemption will be prorated if domicile is greater than a single-family home.

### **Clause 22F (Full Exemption)**

This exemption is available to Veterans or the Surviving Spouses of Veterans, who are certified by the Veteran's Administration as paraplegic or have a 100% disability for service-connected blindness. The Exemption will be prorated if domicile is greater than a single-family home.

### Clause 37A (Exemption - \$500)

### **Blindness**

This exemption is for those individuals who are certified by the Massachusetts Commission for the Blind attesting to legal blindness.

- 1. You must own and occupy your house.
- 2. You must submit a Certificate from the Massachusetts Commission for the Blind attesting to legal blindness annually

### **Clause 41C (Exemption - \$1,000)**

Persons over 65 years of Age

This exemption is for those individuals who are 65 years or older who satisfy certain income, assets and residency requirements.

- 1. You must have lived in Massachusetts for the past 10 years and,
- 2. You must own and occupy your house for at least 5 years and,
- 3. Your annual gross income cannot exceed \$20,000 if single, \$30,000 if married minus Social Security allowance.
- 4. Whole estate, (less value of the home unless home is larger than 4 family) cannot exceed \$40,000 if single, \$55,000 if married.

### **TOWN OF ERVING NEEDS YOU!**



The following Boards and Committees have vacancies:

### Cultural Council – (One vacancy)

Cultural Council members are appointed. The local Cultural Council supports public programs that promote access, education, diversity and excellence in the arts, humanities, and interpretive sciences in communities across the Commonwealth. Local decision-making is an integral element of this system. Local councils have the right and responsibility to award grants that address cultural needs specific to their communities, and they can decide how to distribute funds if the state policies outlined in these regulations and supplementary guidelines are followed. They meet 2-4 times per year.

### Planning Board Alternate

Planning Board Members are elected, but the alternate is an appointed position. The Planning Board is charged with overseeing and guiding development in the community. The Planning Board reviews permit applications for subdivisions and some special permits, and it is designated as the authority for Site Plan Review permits.

### Council on Aging – (Three vacancies)

Councils on Aging & Senior Centers provide support services to elders, families, and caregivers in the community. As a local agency, the Councils on Aging & Senior Centers serve as an elder advocate, offers services, and activities for elders. Council on Aging offerings may include Outreach, Transportation, Meals (congregate or home delivered), Health screenings, Health insurance counseling, Socialization, Fitness, wellness and recreation activities, Life-long learning. They serve as a link to and support for elders. Each Council on Aging determines its own priorities based on local needs and resources. Senior centers are a welcoming place for older adults who wish to remain independent in their community.

### Gill-Montague Regional School District Representative (Two vacancies)

Gill-Montague Representatives are appointed by the Town Moderator and are charged with attending Gill-Montague Reg. School District meetings and advocating for parents and students in the district. The representative also reports information from these meetings to the School Committee. Representatives are non-voting members.

### **HOME HEATING TIPS**

Staying warm in the winter is important! With rising costs, heating your home can be stressful. That's where homeowners and renters can use fuel assistance.

You are eligible for fuel assistance if your household income is not more than 60% of the estimated <u>state median income</u>. For a single-person household, that's \$42,411; for two people that's \$55,461. [For three people it's \$68,511 and \$81,561 for four people.]

These numbers, and more information on who can get help is available on the Community Action website: <a href="https://www.communityaction.us/fuel-assistance">https://www.communityaction.us/fuel-assistance</a>. Locally, Community Action is the agency that processes applications for fuel assistance; the program itself is called LIHEAP in Massachusetts. If you have not used fuel assistance in the last two years, you'll need to first apply and then have an intake.

Apply over the phone (413-774-2310) or online (website above). An application checklist and a list of necessary documents are available online, or you can call the phone number and an automated message will guide you to the list of documents.

Community Action wants its participants to know:

- From Nov 15 March 15, there is a moratorium in place that prevents shutting off your gas or electric if that heats your home
- Fuel assistance can only pay for deliveries/heat usage from Nov 1 to April 30
- Please plan ahead—it can take weeks to process an application
- This is an assistance program; you are still responsible for your bills

Separate from fuel assistance, Community Action has other programs for renters and homeowners, including free energy efficient and weatherization assessments, and programs for homeowners that have funding to repair/replace heating systems. They also have an Older Adult Modification Program to help eligible homeowners age in place.

Please remember that state minimum wage increases to \$15/hr starting January 1<sup>st</sup> and may change income.

### YOUR ENERGY BILLS ARE GOING UP THIS WINTER. HERE'S WHAT YOU CAN DO.



Due to the New England region's reliance on natural gas to fuel our power plants and the impact on gas prices from the war in Ukraine, customers in New England will experience record-high electricity and gas supply prices this winter. Assistance programs are available to help customers pay bills or manage the increase.

### YOUR UTILITY COMPANY CAN HELP

If you are behind on your utility bills, you should call your utility company immediately and ask about their payment plans. Utilities are offering several customer assistance programs, including flexible payment plans (regardless of income) and balance forgiveness plans for those eligible. You will be protected from shutoff if you make payments as scheduled under the plan.

### **INCOME-ELIGIBLE ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS**

Don't wait to apply for income-eligible assistance programs. First, contact your utility to apply for an incomeeligible rate which provides a discount on your whole bill. Second, you may qualify for the federal Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP). LIHEAP eligibility is evaluated based on your gross household income for the past 4 weeks. Use the contact info below to find your local community action agency where you can apply for LIHĖAP.

### MANAGE YOUR USAGE AND BILLS

- Consider contacting Mass Save for an energy efficiency audit to see how you can reduce your overall energy use, which should result in lower monthly bills over time.
- Install a programmable thermostat.
- Enroll in budget billing with your utility.
- Replace outdated light bulbs with ENERGY STAR certified light bulbs.
- Consider solar energy.

#### SHUTOFF MORATORIUM

From November 15 to March 15, there is a moratorium in place that prevents shutting off your gas or electric if you use that to heat your home. But know that you will still owe payment for your bills. To avoid falling into debt, take advantage of fuel assistance programs or enroll in a budget-installment plan.

### OTHER ASSISTANCE

If you don't qualify for income-based assistance, there may also be funds available to assist you. If your household income is between 60 to 80 percent of the state median income, you may be able to receive help from the Good Neighbor Energy Fund.

### **ELECTRIC SUPPLIERS**

A study by the AG's Office found that most electric supplier customers lose money in the long run. Beware of deceptive marketing promising savings as compared to the utility's high winter electric prices. If you have a supplier, check if your rate is still competitive with your utility's. ### Reduce Trash this Holiday Season What to recycle, creatively reuse, and compost

During the holiday season, the average American family disposes of 25% more trash than they usually do (Source: US EPA). Think about your household: could some of this trash be reduced, reused, recycled or composted? When families reduce their holiday trash, they can save money on "Pay As You Throw" town trash stickers or bags, reduce carbon and methane emissions, and protect our environment.

### Recycling Yes/No

DISPOSAL

These items are on the "yes" list for household recycling: wrapping paper, gift bags, tissue paper, and paper greeting cards/envelopes that do NOT contain metallic inks, glitter, or foil (for example, foil-lined envelopes). Tape and labels are okay. Remove batteries from singing greeting cards before recycling the card.

Other recyclable paper items include catalogs, calendars, paper shopping bags, and cardboard (corrugated and paperboard). Here's a holiday tip: when opening or wrapping gifts, keep a paper bag handy to collect paper recyclables.

These items are on the "no" list for household recycling: ribbons, bows, tinsel, glossy photo cards, holiday light strings, Christmas tree netting, bubble wrap, paper envelopes lined with bubble wrap, packing peanuts, Styrofoam in any form, plastic shipping envelopes, or formed plastic used to package toys, electronics, etc.

Holiday light strings, power cords, and Christmas tree netting are not acceptable in municipal recycling programs because these "tanglers" get wrapped around the sorting equipment at recycling facilities.

Recyclables from Franklin County towns are processed at the Springfield Materials Recycling Facility (MRF). For recycling guides, including a colorful yes/no holiday recycling guide, visit <a href="mailto:springfieldmrf.org">springfieldmrf.org</a> and click on "What's Recyclable."

### **Recycling Options for Other Materials**

Holiday light strings and power cords are accepted for recycling at scrap metal dealers and in the scrap metal dumpsters at town transfer stations. In addition, mail-in programs are available at <a href="holidayleds.com">holidayleds.com</a> and <a href="christmas-light-source.com">christmas-light-source.com</a>.

"Pack and ship" stores, for example The UPS Store in Greenfield, accept clean, dry packing materials such as bubble wrap, packing peanuts, and inflatable "air pillow" packaging for reuse.

Plastic bag recycling programs at grocery and retail stores accept bubble wrap, plastic shipping envelopes (no paper), inflatable "air pillow" packaging, and other bags/films marked #2 or #4. A list of acceptable items is at: plasticfilmrecycling.org.

Certain batteries (rechargeable, button, and lithium) are accepted for special recycling at transfer stations; place in a bag or container and hand to attendant.

When the holidays are over, check with your town about Christmas tree recycling. Your tree may be recycled as mulch this spring.

### **Creative Reuse**

In addition to recycling, consider wrapping your gifts in reused materials that you already have at home. Gifts can be creatively wrapped in reused wrapping paper, old calendar pages, sheet music, maps or map book pages, paper bags, old posters, wallpaper scraps, fabric, scarves, newspaper, comics, or kids' artwork.

Gifts can be wrapped in cloth bags, reusable decorative tins, reusable shopping bags, or baskets. Or make the wrapping part of the gift; for example, a kitchen towel or oven mitt to hold kitchen utensils or gadgets, or a book wrapped in a scarf.

Wrapped gifts can be tied up with twine and adorned with pine or holly branches, pinecones, shells or buttons. Last year's holiday cards can be cut up to reuse as beautiful gift cards.

For a fun craft activity with kids, this online tutorial from Tori Avey shows how to make beautiful Hanukkah gift wrap with homemade potato stamps:

toriavey.com/homemade-hanukkah-wrapping-paper/ Grab some reused paper bags, a couple of potatoes, and some acrylic paint or stamp pads. Cut bag along the side and bottom to make one big sheet. Cut the potatoes in half and (adults) carve shapes into the flat potato surface or use cookie cutters to press shapes into ½ inch potato slices. When you are all done, you can cut off the painted parts of the potato and compost the rest!

One of the most important steps for reusing materials is unwrapping gifts carefully and saving gift-wrap, gift boxes, ribbons, bows and gift bags for reuse next year.



### Compost

Another way to reduce holiday trash is to compost food and paper waste generated from holiday meals. Food scraps might seem small, but they add up: 28% of the residential trash in Massachusetts is compostable material such as food and paper waste. (Data from MassDEP's 2019 Waste Characterization Study: <a href="https://tinyurl.com/2019WasteStudy">https://tinyurl.com/2019WasteStudy</a>)

Municipal compost programs accept all types of food waste, including meat, bones, cheese, plus paper waste such as paper napkins, paper towels, and more. Unacceptable items include liquids, foil, metal, glass, and plastic. These programs accept compostable material are free of charge (access permit or entrance fee may be required). The following transfer stations in Franklin County have compost programs: Bernardston, Charlemont, Conway, Deerfield, Greenfield (open to non-residents for a \$5 host fee), Leverett, Montague, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Shelburne, Warwick, Wendell, and Whately.

The Solid Waste District sells discounted "Earth Machine" home compost bins and compost pails to District residents. Pricing is \$25 or \$55 depending on the resident's town. It is not recommended to put meat, bones, dairy in home compost bins. For more details and pricing, contact the solid waste district or see: franklincountywastedistrict.org/Composting



### Please **DO** include the following items in your paper recycling mix:



- ✓ wrapping paper, gift bags, tissue paper (except those with metallic inks, glitter, or foil)
- ✓ corrugated cardboard boxes, paperboard gift boxes
- √ paper shopping bags (any type of handle is okay)
- ✓ paper greeting cards (not with metallic inks, glitter, or foil; remove batteries)
- √ Catalogs, calendars and magazines





- ☑ ribbons, bows, and tinsel (reusable from year to year)
- ☑ holiday light strings (accepted in scrap metal dumpsters, + WtE scrap metal, Greenfield)
- packing peanuts, Styrofoam<sup>™</sup>, bubble wrap, inflatable "air pillow" packaging (clean, dry packing materials accepted for reuse at The UPS Store in Greenfield.)
- ☑ plastic bags, plastic shipping envelopes, bubble wrap, air pillows (these materials plus clean, dry plastic bags marked #2 or #4 accepted in retail plastic bag bins. plasticfilmrecycling.org)
- ☑ formed plastic packaging from items like toys and electronics
- glossy photographs, paper envelopes with bubble wrap inside, ornaments, decorations

TIP: Keep a recycle bin or paper bag handy near gift unwrapping.
